
Last year's Events


During 1997 the Allegheny City Society was busy with a number of events during the Summer and Fall:

Annual William Rimmel Award Presented

On November 9th the Allegheny City Society presented its annual William Rimmel Award to John DeSantis. John has been a resident of Allegheny West for over 20 years. In the late 1970's he became what was then called an urban pioneer, moving into Allegheny West and participating with others in an effort to halt, then reverse decay - turning his neighborhood into a desirable living environment. As a member of the Allegheny West Civic Council, he worked to obtain federal funding for historic street lighting and put on house tours and Spring festivals.

John purchased an old funeral home on Brighton Road. Its restoration gave back to us Holmes Hall. He has graciously encouraged tours of this most amazing mansion.

John has also significantly expanded his sphere of influence when he was appointed Chair of the Historic Review Commission for the City of Pittsburgh. There he gives encouragement, advice and an occasional slap on the wrist for development projects throughout the City. He has gained a reputation for demonstrating that historic preservation is an economic boost to an area. More importantly, that historic character is an attribute that once lost cannot be replaced, at any price.

The William Rimmel Award is presented annually to an individual or organization for outstanding achievement in preserving and interpreting the history of that portion of the City of Pittsburgh that was the City of Allegheny.

William Rimmel was a lifelong resident of the North Side and was best known for the series of columns he wrote for the *Pittsburgh Post Gazette* about life in Allegheny City. These columns earned him the President's Golden Quill Award in 1980, from the Pittsburgh Press Club.

After retiring in from the Post Gazette 1962, he continued to write his columns and maintained a busy schedule of meetings, speeches and writing. He was the author of *The Allegheny Story*, a nostalgic look back at Allegheny City. He died in May 1988 and is buried in Union Dale Cemetery.
